Celebrant It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way.

People hold up their palm branches.

Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Lesson Philippians 2:5-11

Seated

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-- even death on a cross.

Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Reader The Word of the Lord. *People* **Thanks be to God.**

Dramatic Reading of the Triumphal Entry

Scriptural Text from Matthew 21 and Luke 18, 19 (ESV)

Congregation is invited to participate by speaking the part of "Crowd"

Narrator – When Jesus and his followers drew near to Jerusalem and arrived at Bethphage near the Mount of Olives, Jesus said to his disciples

Jesus – Go ahead to the village and there you will find a donkey and a colt there with her. Untie them and bring them to me; and if anyone asks why you are doing this, tell them, "The Lord needs them."

Narrator – This took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the prophet Zechariah:

Prophet – Say to the daughter of Zion, 'Behold your king is coming to you, humble and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden.'

Narrator – And so the disciples went and did as the Lord commanded them, and they found the donkey and her colt, just as he had said. Jesus rode on them into the city of Jerusalem and the crowd gathered in great excitement. Some spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches of palms and laid them on the road and they were shouting:

Crowd – Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the Name of the Lord! Hosanna in the Highest!

Narrator – But some of the Pharisees in the crowd were indignant and rebuked Jesus saying:

Pharisee – Teacher, silence your disciples!

Jesus – I tell you, even if all these people were silent, the very stones would cry out!

Narrator – When Jesus had entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up and asking, “Who is this?” And the crowds replied:

Crowd – This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth of Galilee

Narrator – Jesus then went and entered the Temple and drove out all who sold and bought in the Temple. He overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold pigeons, and he spoke out to them with the words of the prophet Isaiah:

Prophet – My house shall be called a house of prayer, but you make it a den of robbers.

Narrator – And there in the Temple, the blind and the lame came to Jesus and he healed them. And as Jesus was there the children became excited and began to sing out:

Crowd – Hosanna to the Son of David!

Narrator – But when the chief priest and scribes saw all the miraculous things Jesus was doing, and when they heard the children singing, they became angry and said to Jesus:

Pharisee – Do you hear what these children are saying!

Jesus – Yes, I do hear what they are saying. Have you never read what the Scriptures say in the Psalms:

Prophet – Out of the mouth of infants and nursing babies you have set forth praise.

Narrator – So Jesus remained in the Temple teaching the people and healing the sick, and then later left the city for the night and stayed in Bethany. There was all around both tension and excitement in the city and amongst Jesus’ followers. But the disciples had forgotten that before they had arrived in Jerusalem, Jesus had told them:

Jesus – We are going to Jerusalem, and everything that is written about the Son of Man by the prophets will be accomplished. For he will be delivered over to the Gentiles, and will be mocked and shamefully treated and spit upon. And after flogging him they will kill him, and on the third day he will rise from the dead.

Narrator – But the disciples understood none of these things, for Jesus’ words were hidden from them and they did not grasp what was said...

The Sermon The Rev. Benjamin Phillips *Seated*

The Nicene Creed *Standing; said by all*
We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.
